4. Comments:

- Please identify what you perceive to be the real strengths and weaknesses of this instructor and course.
- Amazing professor. Dr. Fessler knows the material in and out and knows how to make his students think about important concepts. Students, whether they cared or actually wanted to, come out of his class being able to think critically about any problem relating to human nature. Unlike other classes, this course strongly impacts how students view their own lives and ought to change their entire outlook their behavior and relationships with others.
- Because his class is 8am, I'm not really awake and its almost impossible to take notes in his class because of how fast he talks. However, I strongly feel like he words his lecture really complicated... rather than simple to really confuse his students. But if you listen to his lecture again during afternoon time, he is very interesting. But talks really fast!!!!!!!! I end up getting 7 notes back to back paper from his one hour lecture..

Instead, he lectures without a script and actually interacts with his students. I also loved that he gave us the possible list of exam essay questions ahead of time, and the fact that he not only allowed but encouraged us all to record lecture on our phones was a huge help. I honestly have zero criticisms or complaints, but obviously if one is expecting a titillating and "easy A" anthropology class then this is not for you. Instead, if you're up for it, Dr. Fessler provides a truly scientific and enlightening class that includes a lot of hard-work, memorization, and critical thinking. But it also will change your life

if you actually put in effort. I truly think Anthro 124P should be cross listed with the EEB department, more students should know about the importance of this class and Dr. Fessler's work. Thank you so much, Dr. Fessler!

- Even though I was skeptical Professor Fessler did not use any power point presentations for his lecture, it motivated me to pay attention in class and re-listen to all his lectures in order to grasp the concepts better. The pop-quizzes were also good because they kept me on top of my readings. The only suggestion I have would be to indicate how much each individual question on a test is worth. It will help students understand what did wrong and improve their answers.
- Every lecture bought a new and unique perspective that made us students think critically. The absence of lecture slides forced us to listen and active engage with the material. The examination method is fair and comprehensive, making students study the material in a critical and creative manner.
- Every undergraduate at UCLA should make the perilous but rewarding trek up MT Fessuvious. This course is as fundamental to the understanding of our lives as Calculus, Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. You can operate a machine without understanding how it works, but you should never operate one without understanding its ultimate purpose. I would be akin to handing a loaded gun to a child without the safety on. I don't want to say more than that about the course, because it should be experienced through fresh eyes, without any spoilers.

The course itself is structured so that it seems simple as you are working through the material for the first time, but then the underlying complexity reveals itself at the end through all the interactions the material has with itself. The tests are puzzles—hard IQ checks. Warning: if you don't trust yourself to synthesize large amounts of material by making connections and applying logical inferences, no amount of pure memorization will help you. This course is not a grind, it's about strategy.

One thing I really didn't appreciate were the quizzes, not because of their content, but because of how they were administered: Randomly, and at the very beginning of the class. I was late only twice to class (by only a few minutes), and both times I missed quizzes. An 8:00 AM class is already intrinsically punishing to those who commute, but to double the costs for a functionally arbitrary group of students didn't sit well with me.

Fessler himself is very smart, often funny, and for the most part—very well spoken. Considering he doesn't use any slides and doesn't have a strict script, his lectures were remarkably cogent. This is why it's disappointing when he randomly jumps into "obtuse mode" in his lectures. He has a proclivity to—in the absence of any functional reason—use words and phrases to describe ideas and models that can be described just as well or perhaps even better using words and phrases of lesser complexity, and ordered in such a way to enhance understanding—instead of obscuring it behind redundant verbosity and layers of clauses which are functions of one another. Or: he unnecessarily complicates things. I think this is because he wants to be very precise, but at a certain point, the costs of doing so outweigh the benefits.

So do yourself a favor and take this course. Record the lectures, caffeinate yourself up before class, pay very close attention, take really good notes, and think hard about the material. In the long run and maybe even in the short run, you will be better off for it.

You are given the questions for the exams in advance which means that preparedness is really on you. The exams can be a bit tricky in that they ask you to display mastery of the course, however it is often difficult to zero in on exactly how to answer them at times because the course material is all so tightly intertwined. However, the grading is fair and the professor and TAs make an effort to help you as much as they can.

If you're looking for a class that will challenge your preconceptions, make you laugh and/or cry and stick with you for the rest of your life, take this course.

- Professor Fessler's class is an extremely interesting! I have learned so much that can be applied to every day life. His quizzes were a bit stressful but it did make sure that the class kept up with the readings. I would however find another incentive to do the readings, especially those who has test anxiety. The midterm was fair and integrated many of the topics learned in class. The class was difficult but especially worth taking. He makes learning fun and lectures engaging. There are not many 8am's I

would sign up for but I would sign up for this one again if given the opportunity. The readings can be sometimes lengthy and difficult to understand but he is willing to further explain them or clarify if you're confused. Only weakness is the speed at which the professor speaks. I have to go over the recordings multiple times to catch what he says and it can be a bit frustrating and time consuming.

- Strengths are that professor Fessler honestly interested in the topics that he discusses in his lectures. His factual evidence mixed with his storytelling in lectures are amazing and very interesting. A weakness that the professor has is that sometimes his terminology can be too scientific, but this is an anthro bio class.

Weakness: Maybe consider podcasting lectures? It would certainly help a lot of students better grasp any difficult concepts. Also, it may be a good idea to ask that his TA's please explain the way they are going to grade exams/ what they are looking for, because it's too difficult to please different people with different minds. So, maybe not just present the material, but also teach us how to think critically about it for a test and why it should matter to us beyond the scope of the class. Some articles were most likely not the strongest reading material out there. Maybe reconsider posting certain articles that add little to no value to what you are trying to teach?

- The course materials and concepts were very interesting. The professor was engaging and entertaining. I apply many of the concepts I learned from class to my life. I like the message of avoiding the naturalistic fallacy. It has enabled me to question peoples' actions and even speak out against some. I wish that the professor posted his lectures to bruincast because I was sick for 2 weeks and it was difficult to learn the material. I also wish the quizzes didn't start at 8am sharp. I would arrive at 8:04 and miss the quizzes entirely. The midterm was graded harshly and I wish there was a rubric to outline what the professor was looking for. Overall, it was a wonderful class in terms of its interesting and relevant topics and engaging professor. It was just difficult to keep up if things happen and very little room for error.
- The professor is obviously very knowledgeable about the subject. I never found myself checking the clock during class meaning his lectures were highly engaging. I wish I had gone to office hours more, but I felt a bit intimidated as I am not an anthropology major. I think the course could be improved it were a smaller class size where student questions/comments could be taken and discussed. I believe with a topic like this class discussions can be very valuable.
- The professor was very intellectual and knew what he was talking about. However, the dated articles, and overhead projector lecture style was a nuisance.
- The strengths of the instructor was their phenomenal lectures, and communication of material using relatable examples. A strength of the course was its ability to cover all facets of human sexual evolution, and how it answered the questions that most humans wonder about. An opportunity for the course to improve is to reconsider the exam format. While the exam provokes a student to think critically, the exam's format of being 100% essay questions can result in subjective answers from students. This leaves the students answers to those questions susceptible to being misinterpreted by graders, and marked wrong. Consider including multiple choice answers for a portion of the exam to give students that may not have strengths in articulation the ability to prove they know the answer if presented to them as a choice.
- This class was extremely interesting. I was very interested in the content but the style of teaching was very difficult for me to study. I take notes and recordings but often audio learning is very difficult and even a video of him on stage would have been preferable. Also I found the exams rather challenging but... you know thats how it goes i guess

- This was the hardest class I've taken at UCLA. The material is incredibly dense and the concepts were very challenging for me. Professor Fessler was very knowledgeable and personable, but I sometimes found that he went quite fast through the presented topics to the point where I felt I missed a lot while trying to take notes on what he said and before I knew he'd be on to something else. There are no powerpoints, so it is imperative to pay incredibly close attention to everything he says in class. There are no pauses to really absorb what he is saying, he basically talks the entire 75 minutes and everything he says is an important concept.
